What a privilege it is to be sharing some of the highlights of our hard-working team from around the country. I am reminded of Paul's words to the Corinthian church concerning his work in Ephesus when he said he would stay there "because a great door of effective work has opened up for me."

This summer period has been extremely fruitful. Over the last 4 months we have been able to minister the word of God and the gospel to over 13 000 people around the country.

In February we held our first formal Waitangi mission at Waitangi. We had seven on the team and for 2 and a half days we were run off our feet giving out resources and sharing who Christ is. There was much confusion in people's minds about Christ but at the same time an openness to engage and consider who He is and what He has done. Over the course of this event, we gave away 3450 bilingual Christian calendars, 1120 gospel comics (From Creation to Christ), 3000 large text Bible verses, 2000 medium text Bible verses and Karakia, 200 Gospels of John and about 400 Tārore stories with the Gospel of Luke.

I also want to say a big thank you for all your support. We feel so privileged to be part of the Lord's work in transforming lives. I hope this latest update will be an encouragement as you are too us.

Please pray for souls to be saved from these. Joanne and I have been encouraged by offers to support this work.

In this first part of the year, I've tried to concentrate on my family and my neighborhood. Some time, however, has been spent out in Palmerston North city, particularly with a friend of mine, and at two houses that I do some chaplaincy in. I have found that I have been able to have many

I need to spend some time in physical rehabilitation over the next few months and am expecting this to open conversational opportunities at the local pool/gym. Also, I had some opportunity with a friend several months ago to do some door-to-door work and I will be looking to try reestablishing that over the next few months.

In the city I meet all sorts of people, and without wanting to discount any conversations, I do occasionally get to speak with someone that seems to have been really impacted by our encounter.

Square ministry is always a challenge! We usually go on Fridays to preach and share. One of the guys who argues with us has been preaching against us. Recently, he gave some reasons

Steve and his family have had to shift to temporary accommodation, but the good news is they have found a suitable rental to shift into soon. It has been stressful, and they are looking forward to settling in.

He and a friend have been going to Canterbury University twice a week to share the gospel and hand out tracts. They try to gauge common factors in student's lives and take it from there. 
